

## Works Cited / Works Consulted

Based on MLA Style 4/05

**SOURCES IN PRINT:** Books, Magazines, Newspapers, Pamphlets

### PAGE FORMAT:

1. The title should read, "Works Cited" or "Works Consulted" and be centered at the top of the page.
2. The entire list of citations should be alphabetized by the first letter of each citation.  
If the citation begins with A, An, or The, **include** the A, An, or The, but alphabetize by the **2<sup>nd</sup> word**.

### CITATION FORMAT:

1. The first line of the citation is flush with the left margin. The second line is indented five spaces.
2. Double space within the citation. (This was not done in the examples below in order to save space.)
3. Double space between citations.
4. City Format: If the city is unfamiliar across the nation, include the postal abbreviation of its state. E.g. Redmond, WA
5. Date format: day mon. year. If there is no date, write **n.d.**  
Months are written as follows: **Jan. Feb. Mar. Apr. May June July Aug. Sept. Oct. Nov. Dec.**

<b>Book with Two Authors</b>	Author (Last name, First name and First name Last name). <u>Title</u> . City of publication: Publisher, year published. Wartik, Emily and Lavonne Carlson. <u>Memory and Learning</u> . New York: Chelsea, 1993.
<b>Book with Three or more Authors</b>	Author (Last name, First name), et al. <u>Title</u> . City of publication: Publisher, year published. Chambers, Mortimer, et al. <u>The Western Experience</u> . New York: McGraw-Hill, 1998.
<b>Book with translator</b>	Author (Last name, First name). <u>Title</u> . Trans. (First name Last name). City of publication: Publisher, year published. Dostoevsky, Fyodor. <u>Crime and Punishment</u> . Trans. Constance Garnett. New York: Bantam, 1981.
<b>Book—anthology (collection of works): essay, short story, play, or poem—same author</b>	Author (Last name, First name). Selection. [See note] <u>Title</u> . City of publication: Publisher, year published. Pages. [Note: essays, short stories, or poems are in quotation marks/plays are underlined.] Bradbury, Ray. "I Sing the Body Electric!" <u>The Stories of Ray Bradbury</u> . New York: Knopf, 1978. 709-736. [↑ example of a short story] O'Neill, Eugene. <u>Lazarus Laughed</u> . <u>Nine Plays</u> . New York: Modern Library, 1941. 381-484. [↑ example of a play]
<b>Book—anthology (collection of works): essay, short story, play, or poem—different authors</b>	Author (Last name, First name). Selection. [See note] <u>Title</u> . Ed. (First Name Last Name). City of publication: Publisher, year published. Pages. [Note: essays, short stories, or poems are in quotation marks/plays are underlined.] Poe, Edgar Allan. "The Cask of Amontillado." <u>200 Years of Great American Short Stories</u> . Ed. Martha Foley. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1975. 93-99. [↑ example of a short story] Wilson, August. <u>Ma Rainey's Black Bottom</u> . <u>Famous American Plays of the 1980's</u> . Ed. Robert Marx. New York: Dell, 1988. 415-520. [↑ example of a play]
<b>Book with an Editor(s) (unsigned article)*</b>	"Article Title." <u>Title</u> . Editor(s) (First Name Last Name). City of publication: Publisher, year published. Pages. "Nelson Mandela." <u>Heroes of Conscience</u> . Eds. Kathlyn Gay and Martin K. Gay. Santa Barbara: ABC-CLIO, 1996. 242-246.
<b>Book with an Editor(s) (signed article)*</b>	Article Author (Last name, First name). "Article Title." <u>Title</u> . Editor(s) (First Name Last Name). City of publication: Publisher, year published. Pages. Petchuck, David A. "Pythagoras of Samos." <u>Notable Mathematicians</u> . Ed. Robyn V. Young. Detroit: Gale, 1998. 407-408.

\*A book with an editor, but with no articles, should follow the format for Book with One Author or Book with Two Authors, etc. After the editor's name, place a comma and the abbreviation "ed." E.g.: **Miller, Joseph, ed.** For two or more editors, use the abbreviation "eds."

<b>Multi-volumed Book—using multiple volumes</b> (one author or editor—no signed articles)*	Author or Ed. (Last name, First name.) <u>Title</u> . # of volumes. City of publication: Publisher, year published.

	Bonk, Mary Rose, ed. <u>Worldmark Yearbook 2001</u> . 3 vols. Detroit: Gale, 2001. [↑ <i>Example of an editor</i> ]
*Entries with articles signed by different authors must be entered as separate citations. Use format for: <u>Multi-volumed Book—using one volume</u> for each signed article.

<b>Magazine</b> (unsigned article) single issue or bound e.g. <u>CQ Researcher</u>	“Article Title.” <u>Name of Magazine</u> Date published (day mon. year): page numbers. [ <i>Notes: no period after the name of magazine—use a “+” if the article continues on a non-consecutive page.</i> ]
	“The Spouse in the White House.” <u>Vogue</u> Apr. 2000: 366-370+.
<b>Magazine</b> (signed article) single issue or bound e.g. <u>CQ Researcher</u>	Article Author (Last name, First name). “Article Title.” <u>Name of Magazine</u> Date published (day mon. year): page numbers. [ <i>Notes: no period after the name of magazine—use a “+” if the article continues on a non-consecutive page.</i> ]

<b>Newspaper</b> (unsigned article)	“Article Title.” <u>Name of Newspaper</u> Date published (day mon. year), Edition if given: page numbers. [ <i>Notes: no period after the name of newspaper— a “+” if the article continues on a non-consecutive page—if there’s no edition, use a “:” after the article’s date.</i> ]
	“AT&T Wireless IPO Expected to be Biggest in U.S. History.” <u>Eastside Journal</u> 29 Mar. 2000: C1+.
<b>Newspaper</b> (signed article)	Article Author (Last name, First name). “Article Title.” <u>Name of Newspaper</u> Date of publication (day mon. year), Edition if given: page numbers. [ <i>Notes: no period after the name of newspaper—use a “+” if the article continues on a non-consecutive page— if there’s no edition, use a colon after the article’s date.</i> ]

<b>Pamphlet</b>	Treat as a book.

<b>Government Pamphlet</b>	Name of government. Name of agency. <u>Title</u> . City of publication: Publisher, date published (day mon. year).
